**A RESOLUTION ADOPTING A TRANSITION PLAN ALIGNING WITH
NORTHWEST COLORADO RESILIENCY AND RECOVERY ROADMAP**

WHEREAS, the Northwest Colorado Development Council (NWCDC) developed and adopted a Northwest Colorado Resiliency and Recover Roadmap (henceforth called Roadmap) that will result in regionally-aligned and actionable strategies that will help its rural communities recover from COVID and other major challenges to be more resilient to future shocks and stressors. In Northwest Colorado, the sun setting of coal and the transition of the region’s two coal-fired power plants represent a significant future threat that has far-reaching consequences; and

WHEREAS, sixteen regional teams comprised of 150 rural communities, including the NWCDC actively worked with a team of state partners and consultants to collaborate on regional economic development and to undertake the Roadmaps strategic planning process. As a member community of NWCDC, the Town of Oak Creek participated in monthly NWCDC meetings and five task forces to prioritize; and

WHEREAS, Oak Creek representatives identified the following sectors that aligned with its competitive advantages, including health care, clean energy generation, light manufacturing, outdoor recreation and cultural heritage tourism, value-added agriculture, and technology and business services sectors. Other priorities include expanding and supporting small businesses and workforce development opportunities and options for affordable housing and childcare.

THAT:**



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Executive Summary

The Colorado Rural Resiliency and Recovery Roadmaps program ("Roadmaps Program") has been funded by the U.S. Economic Development Administration and administered by the Department of Local Affairs (DOLA) Colorado Resiliency Office in partnership with the Office of Economic Development and International Trade (OEDIT), the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment (CDLE) and nonprofit Community Builders.

16 regional teams comprised of 150 rural communities, including the Northwest Colorado Development Council (NWCDC) actively worked with a team of state partners and consultants. The NWCDC is an intergovernmental agreement between Rio Blanco, Moffat, and Routt Counties and their seven communities to collaborate on regional economic development and to undertake the Roadmaps strategic planning process. As a member community of NWCDC, the Town of Oak Creek participated in monthly NWCDC meetings and five task forces to prioritize and strategize around shared regional objectives through a two-year planning and implementation process.

NWCDC developed and adopted a Northwest Colorado Resiliency and Recover Roadmap (henceforth called Roadmap) that will result in regionally-aligned and actionable strategies that will help its rural communities recover from COVID and other major challenges to be more resilient to future shocks and stressors. In Northwest Colorado, the sunsetting of coal and the transition of the region's two coal-fired power plants represent a significant future threat that has far-reaching consequences.

The Roadmap identified six target industries and a key economic development strategy. Those target sectors include: 1) health care; 2) clean energy; 3) light manufacturing; 4) value-added agriculture/food processing; 5) outdoor recreation and cultural heritage tourism; 6) technology and business services; and 7) small business development. Other strategies focused on enhancing workforce development, growing options for affordable housing, and improving access to child care and regional transportation. Under the Roadmap regional framework, Oak Creek's leaders and partners identified the target sectors that would fit the community's unique competitive advantages which emerged from a SWOT analysis (Appendix). The team (identified below) then articulated a vision and transition goals and formulated local strategies for Oak Creek that aligned with the regional Roadmap. Led by the NWCDC Project Manager Christine Rambo and John Bristol, Executive Director of Routt County Economic Development Partnership, the team discussed local economic conditions and identified key target sectors of interest, local priorities, and strategies which are outlined in the following action matrix. With its strategic location near Steamboat Springs, Hayden and Stagecoach, Oak Creek can leverage regional opportunities for its residents. Less than 30 minutes from Steamboat Springs, Oak Creek is considered a bedroom community with a population of 900 where many of its residents commute to work elsewhere. In order to support its existing small businesses and grow new sectors in light of significant economic transition, Oak Creek identified the following sectors that aligned with its competitive advantages, including health care, clean energy generation, light manufacturing, outdoor recreation and cultural heritage tourism, value-added agriculture, and technology and business services sectors. Other priorities include expanding and supporting small businesses and workforce development opportunities and options for affordable housing and childcare.

VISION: The Town of Oak Creek will become a place that provides sustainable, affordable workforce housing and offers residents and visitors an exceptional and livable community, quality of life, health care, regional K-12 educational facilities, and economic opportunities.

TRANSITION GOALS: In alignment with the Roadmap, the Town of Oak Creek will leverage its strategic location and assets to support incremental growth of its existing businesses and new sectors and to attract new opportunities in Health Care, Clean Energy, Light Manufacturing, OREC and Cultural Heritage Tourism, Value-added Agriculture, and Technology and Business Support Services.

OBJECTIVES: Oak Creek will grow its healthcare sector to attract external healthcare dollars that support new jobs and other local businesses; backfill current vacant properties with light manufacturing and small businesses; and support outdoor recreation tourism, value-added agricultural/food processing, and technology and business services by engaging with the South Routt School District, Colorado Northwestern Community College, and economic development partners. Oak Creek seeks to attract and retain a skilled workforce and build a more livable community, including supporting affordable housing, access to child care, and regional transportation.

Why these industry sectors make sense for Oak Creek

As NWDC implements its regional Roadmap Plan, Oak Creek will focus on specific strategies and action steps that connect and contribute to the region's larger economic growth and diversification. Recognizing that not all communities have the appropriate assets, desire, and opportunities to attract and grow every sector in the Roadmap Plan, Oak Creek has decided to focus on the following sectors that fit its strengths and opportunities.

Health Care is one of the largest employers in Oak Creek and Routt County representing nearly 1,800 jobs in the County and has a location quotient of 1.01. A location quotient represents the concentration of a specific industry, and a ratio above 1 demonstrates a higher concentration in this sector. South Routt Medical Center (SRMC) is a special health services district and community healthcare center serving the population of Oak Creek which is about 860 and the surrounding South Routt County area with a population of approximately 4,100. SRMC with 10-15 employees provides primary care, women's health, pediatric care, urgent care, immunizations, in-house laboratory testing, oral health services through Northwest Colorado Health (a federally qualified health center), and physical therapy through UCHealth. Patient demand for healthcare services has outstripped the facility's current capacity to serve. The facility was built to accommodate 2,000-2,800 patients per year, but SRMC currently serves over 7,000—and over 11,300 during COVID-19. The current patient load represents a dramatic increase of +300% since 2014. Demand is expected to grow with Routt County's population projected to grow by 41.3% by 2050, and South Routt is expected to see a disproportionate share of this growth. With the increased demand for healthcare services, expanding the healthcare sector, which offers wages between \$44,311 - \$61,375 on average, serves multiple objectives for Oak Creek: 1) to diversify the economy while meeting the essential needs of the population; 2) to create good paying jobs; 3) support local businesses like pharmacies, medical and office supply businesses; and 4) to attract new healthcare dollars into the local economy. SRMC currently draws from South and West Routt and as far as Grand and Moffat Counties. Patients coming into Oak Creek for medical treatment will increase daytime traffic to support local small businesses including restaurants, retailers, and gas stations.

Clean Energy Generation: Oak Creek's proximity to Xcel Energy Hayden Station, a power generation plant located 24 miles north in the Town of Hayden, represents an opportunity for the Town. Hayden Station's transition to renewable energy, possibly to biomass, will create new job opportunities for Oak Creek residents and attract job seekers to nearby towns. Oak Creek's lower cost of living and good school district, South Routt School District, will draw new residents. The Town should engage with Colorado Northwestern Community College and Soroco High School for workforce development opportunities in clean energy.

Light Manufacturing: Oak Creek's industrial/commercial properties offer backfill opportunities to small to medium size light manufacturers. The Town's proximity to Steamboat Spring's expanding OREC light manufacturing sector creates opportunities to provide low-cost land for expanding operations. Routt County has a highly concentrated specialization in recreational goods.

OREC/Cultural Heritage Tourism: Surrounded by recreational areas, local parks, and Stagecoach State Park and its 820-acre reservoir, Oak Creek offers extensive trails and abundant outdoor activities, including hunting, hiking, biking, fishing, boating, camping, and more. Oak Creek will continue to support more outdoor recreational (OREC) tourism. With its strategic location near Steamboat Springs, a major tourism hub, Oak Creek is well-positioned to support this sector. Routt County has a high concentration of employment in the arts, entertainment, and recreation sector with 1,625 jobs and a LQ of 3.06, three times the national ratio. The tourism-related Accommodations and Food Services sector in Routt County employs 2,430 and has a 1.67 LQ – above the national ratio of 1.

Value-added Agricultural/Food Processing: The agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting sector employs 745 people in Routt County with a specialized concentration of 1.34 LQ, higher than the national ratio. Agriculture is embedded in the culture of Oak Creek and resonates with the community and its tradition of environmental stewardship. A focus on value-added agricultural and food processing will leverage agricultural production from producers across South Routt and Soroco High School's Ag program with its USDA meat processing facility, commercial kitchen, food science labs and greenhouses. Soroco High School students participating in this agricultural career technical pathway graduate with certificates and are job-ready for agricultural occupations. Working with NWCD to grow the regional capacity for value-added agricultural and food processing activities, Oak Creek can support nearby ranchers and farmers and economic development and ag partners.

Technology and Business Services: This sector represents a new and emerging industry in Oak Creek. The Town's broadband infrastructure has already attracted the in-migration of location-neutral workers to Oak Creek. The Town's more affordable housing options offer remote workers an alternative to Steamboat Springs' escalating housing costs. Unlike other sectors, Northwest Colorado's remote location does not pose a logistical challenge and the transportation premium is not an issue for technology and business services companies.

SWOT ANALYSIS

A SWOT analysis evaluates a community's internal strengths and weaknesses and external opportunities and threats. When an alignment is found between a community's strengths and opportunities, an economic strategy emerges. In contrast, internal weaknesses constrain economic growth and limit an ecosystem's ability to leverage new opportunities. Internal weaknesses must be addressed. Threats originate from outside the community and are often outside of leaders' control. Strategies to diversify and create more resiliency within an economy can reduce a threat's impact on the community.
